Malstabodarna ODIN (IRE/S) & Franjo Nordmann (Ger)

The fact that I found Malstabodarna Odin at all was a great coincidence in my life!

I had previously bred English Setters for hunting for about 40 years. Initially to hunt small game on the moors and farmland where I lived. We had very good tracks and on the best hunts we brought together more than 100 pieces of 'small game' in one hunting day. From 1998 to 2015, I also hunted sharptail grouse and partridge with my dogs in Montana. I gave three bitches to them. They were my 'best'. It was only after that that I gradually understood what bird hunting above the pointing dog actually meant. At some point, my dam line, which had existed since 1958, could no longer be continued. I visited Ireland for this reason; because the Irish Setters I had trained for owners (DPCh Birdhunters Angie (1985), Odessa Römerkastell-Welzheim (2002), Lohman's Olga (2007); Grace vom Kapellenpfad (2010), Lohmann's Queenie (2012) had worked very well after the shot.

During this time I was a senior official for pointers and setters in Northern Germany and so I was able to inspire some breeders to travel with me to Ireland to see what Irish Setters can do. I travelled in the knowledge that Ireland belonged to Europe and therefore the I.K.C. was a full member of the F.C.I. and therefore the standard of the Irish RED Setter and the Irish Red and White Setter could be enforced. I contacted the Secretary of the Irish Red Setter Club Ireland and Seamus O'Neill replied that we could come.

The Irish Red Setter Club main searches I saw made me realise that the Irish Setters I saw were working at a very high level. I showed my older English Setter bitch (with lots of experience on American Grouse) and a very young Pointer bitch who was getting more attention. This pointer bitch got a second walk together with Ballydavid Storm handled by Paul Thompson. Storm made a great point in front of my dog. Now it was clear; I wanted a female puppy from Storm! I didn't realise that I would never get a female puppy from this line!!!!!!! So I buried my wishes because Hugh Brady and Paul would keep all the female puppies. Obviously word of my interest in this litter had spread in Germany and Christiane Lohman; Kennel Lohman's; bought Mastabodarna ODIN. After about a year Brigitte Schröder informed me that Malstabodarna ODIN was for sale. I let him run for a year on snipe and woodcock in the moor without whistling once.

After that I realised what I had gained: a dog for life!!!!!!

Ger. FTCh. Malstabodarna Odin, an Irish Setter, has shown outstanding abilities and performance in various field trials that set him apart from other dogs.

Excellent style and breed-typical features

- Odin is characterized by an excellent style, breed-typical head carriage and movement. He shows a powerful and expansive search with typical Irish Setter head carriage, which is particularly emphasized in the reports from the trials in Vechta 2022 and 2019.
 - Odin is known for his systematic and energetic search. He makes the most of the terrain, making wide loops and always staying downwind. His high will to find game and his ability to locate and present game are particularly noteworthy.
 - Obedience and control; Odin is very obedient and well under control. He shows strong nerves, even when disturbed by his partner, and behaves correctly when stalking and shooting
 - Compared to other dogs in the tests run, such as Bjerkaasens BS-SIFF or Bart van de Tielerswaard, Odin stands out for his consistent obedience, systematic search and high head posture. While other dogs often had problems with the system or obedience, Odin was able to implement these aspects consistently and excellently.
- Malstabodarna Odin, an Irish Setter, has achieved considerable success in various field trials. Here are some of his notable achievements:

- **Vechta March 2019** At this event, Malstabodarna Odin achieved a placement of **“Excellent” and 18 points, as well as the titles CAC and CACIT**. He showed an excellent style, breed-appropriate head carriage and movement, and a systematic search. Despite a disobedience at the end of the minute of freedom, which led to his temporary disqualification, he was ultimately recognized for his performance. **Winner 2022 “Royal Cup” (best dog on the two days Vechta): Malstabodarna Odin.**
- **Vechta March 2022:** Here **Malstabodarna Odin** again achieved an **“Excellent” rating and 18 points, as well as the titles CAC and CACIT**. He showed a powerful and expansive search with typical Irish Setter head carriage, the best systematics and was very easy to guide and under control. He made an excellent approach to the pheasant and showed strong nerves, despite interference from his partner. **Vilsev Nilsson** with Heike Sporleder gewannen am 1. Tag **“Excellent” rating and 18 points, as well as the titles CAC and CACIT**
- **Winner Barrage “Royal Cup” (best dog on the two days Vechta) 2022: Malstabodarna Odin.** A barrage was held for the winner of the “Royal Cup”. Ger.FTCh. Malstabodarna Odin against Multi FTCh Vislev Nilssonme day.
- Odin won 5th place twice in the Irish IKC National Field Trials for pointers and setters for snipe in 2018 and received a “Certificate of Honor” in 2021.
- On October 15 and 16, 2018, Odin passed the J.G.H.V.'s Verbandsgebrauchshund (VGP) test with 330 points (336 possible) and a 1st prize and Winner. This test for versatile pointing dogs has the highest rating among German hunters. Hunting work in the forest, field, water, retrieving and obedience are tested as a performance test. Even the smallest mistake leads to a deduction of points.

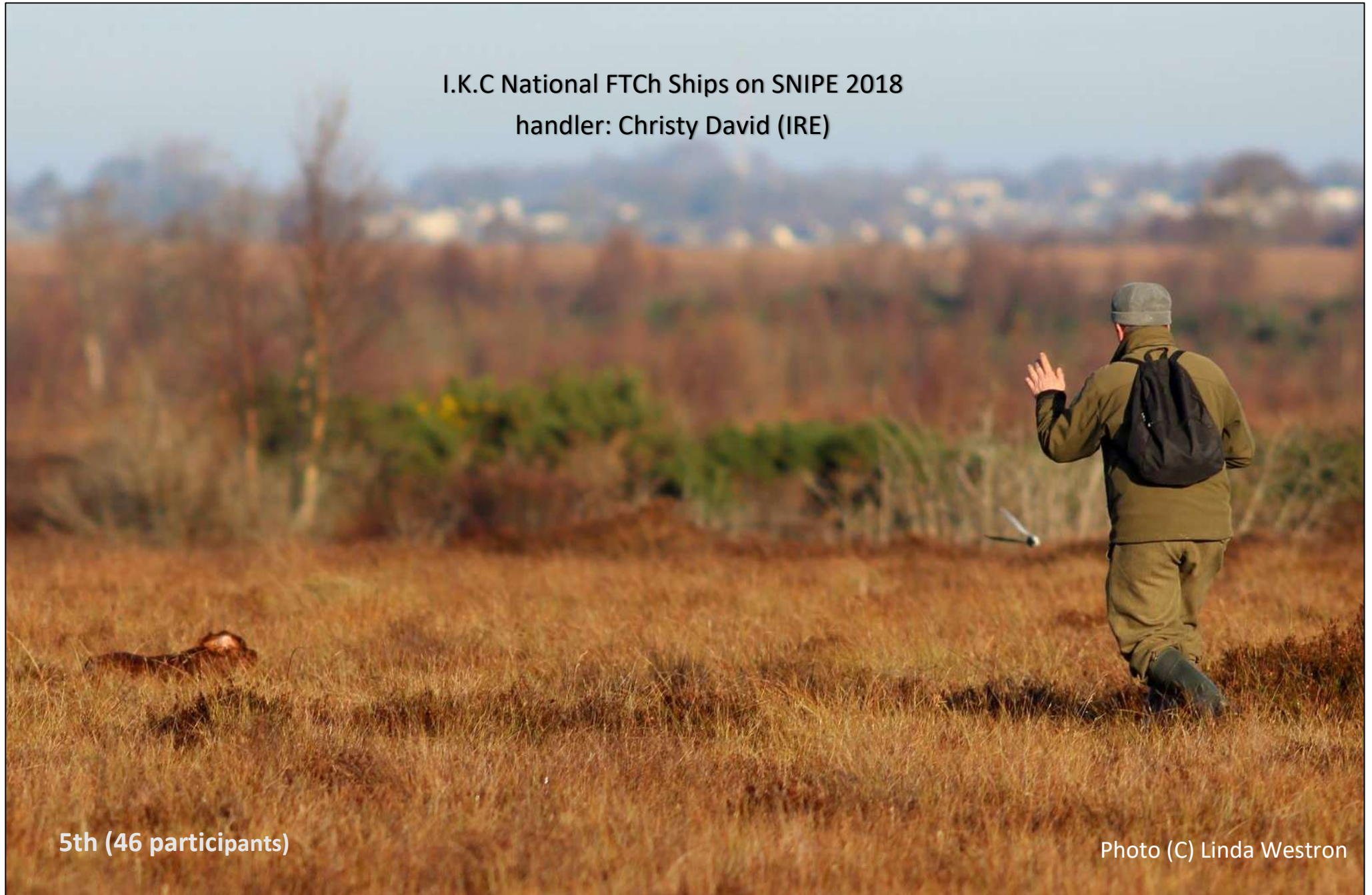

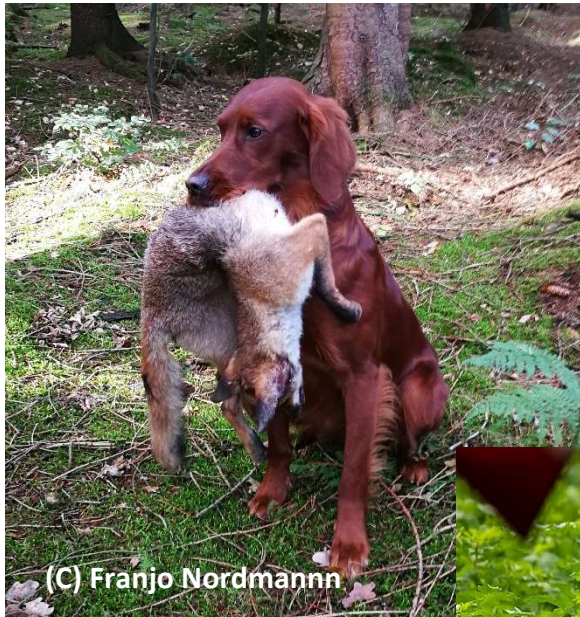

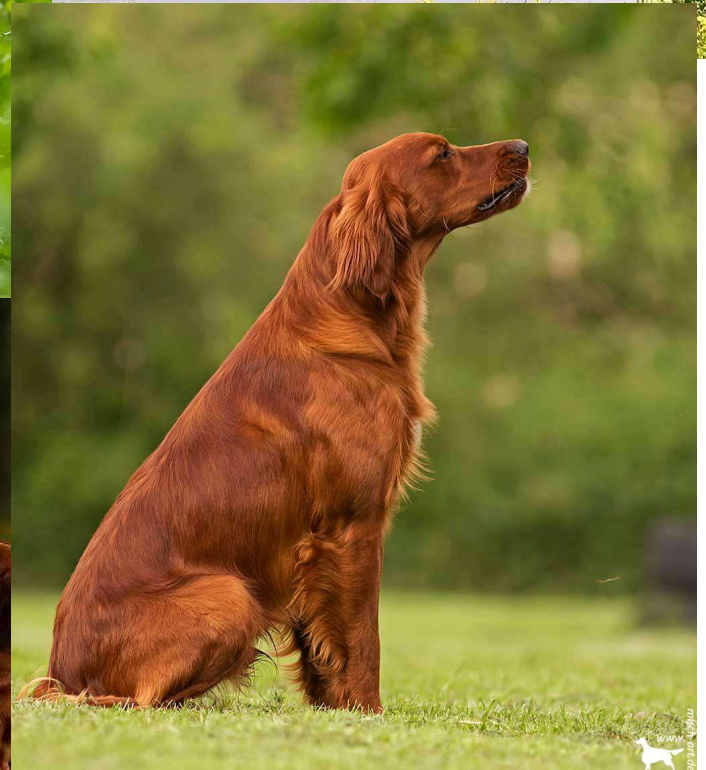

Notes on the siblings of MALSTABODARNA ODIN (Maldabordana Idun & Embla both in total 6x IKC Irish Red Setter of the year)

“Setters & Shooting in Glen Prosen” from Hugh Brady from Irish Country Sports and Country Life - Summer 2021

“... There are informal introductions to the guns for the day and the cavalcade of “estate Landies” snake up to the

A pack of Black Game for FTCh Malstabodarna Idun. allotted part of the Estate for the day. The vista is truly mesmerising with a hanging valley crafted from a glacier millennia earlier. The sheer scale of the mountains and rugged beauty made you feel incredibly fortunate to become an active part of this landscape.

When the Land Rovers jangle to a stop, everyone jumps out and the wind whips into you. The Head keeper then points to some distant land across a multitude of gargantuan mountains which will be our ultimate destination. Definitely a sporting challenge and not for the faint hearted. Safety rules are repeated and if there is a team of guns, this is where they are paired. Only two guns per dog's point, reinforcing the sporting element of the day. Lunch would normally be taken on the heath but if the weather is not suitable it is in a refurbished “bothy”. When the dog sets, the pair of guns move twenty yards left and right of the dog It is

always helpful for the dog handlers if the shooting party has previously shot over dogs. Guns with driven shoot experience are used to cocking their guns at the peg and wait for the arrival of the birds. They are also more familiar with shooting from a stationary position and therefore moving in tandem with a setting dog is very different for them. The plan is that when the dog sets, the pair of guns move twenty yards to the left and right of the dog. The dog forms the bottom of this triangle. As the dog draws forward, the expectation is the grouse will rise within shooting range of the guns.

Our own plan would be informal but unlike the Wedding Feast of Cana, you normally start with the infallible dogs. As described, it is different to field trials but over the years the team has consisted of three international field trial champions, and four field trial champions and a pair of pups. The dogs are normally run singly and rotated every fifteen minutes with the pups getting their turns in more suitable ground and into the wind. Normally, the pups would complete one run to every two runs of the adult dogs. The pups run will end with a find even if it is only recently off the lead. Joan handles the dogs first until we have a few successful grouse situations. She handles either Starjet or Idun. You are hoping to have a few grouse in the bag early on to get the day off to a good start and reduce the pressure for the

rest of the day. Experience has shown that as the day continues, fatigue, cramp and general tiredness of carrying a gun, the shooting will become more erratic. The bag limit for the day is twelve brace, which is considerable given the difficulty of the terrain.

A dog must be very staunch holding their game

As someone working the dogs, you want them to be perfect. The commitment of the team of keepers not to mention the shooting party and their guests for this day can definitely create butterflies in your stomach. The most significant challenge is the time waiting for the guns to arrive to the setting dog. A dog must be very staunch holding their game. With such time delays the packs of grouse usually run, especially if the point is on a downward slope. This requires the dog to remain focussed and using air scent, rather than foot scent lead the guns in the most direct route to the seat of the birds. Another significant challenge, again vastly different as to how we train and compete, is the wind direction. We always work our dogs into the wind. On a shoot day the direction is a specific location so often the dogs have not the benefit of the head wind. However, neither of these potential issues caused any difficulties over our days.

There are other aspects that are to be expected but are not commonly tested in practice in Ireland. The ability of the dog to produce a pack of grouse holding steady as each bird is flushed while shots ring out. Remaining staunch until the guns have reloaded and producing any remaining birds on command is vital for these days. Experience has shown that while the majority of the

pack can be missed, a sitting single grouse produced after the barrage of initial shots can be successfully shot. Perhaps a single bird focuses the mind, or there is less adrenaline than the clatter of wings of a large pack of grouse?

As one of my interests is field trial competitions, there is also expectations of the dogs that may be quite impervious to the guns. While presumably the guns and the keepers appreciate a wide running dog searching each side, thereby reducing the forward distance of the guns and certainly the speed of that walk, I also expect dogs to show dash and style in their quest.

It is a given, the wider the dog searches each side of the guns, the better chance of happening on to game. The speed of the search may not be as important to the guns albeit I do believe it is part of the spectacle. Irish red setters are not renowned for unproductive points, stopping where the birds have left, so this has not thus far been an issue. There would be nothing worse than dragging tired guns to the top of one of

these steep peaks with no birds when they get there!

The retrieval of the shot grouse by the estates Labrador team is more good training for the young setters. Their instinct is to move through the cone of scent to the seat of the bird. With falling birds, the setters must drop to shot and remain there till the birds are retrieved to hand.

Another unexpected but marvellous surprise was the amount of black game on the estate. Black Game, as I had experienced hunting them in Sweden, have in some ways the characteristic of the pheasant in that they are able runners. On a usual shoot day in Glen Prosen, there could be five or so points on Black Game. Though plentiful in Glen Prosen, they are not shot and are protected by the Estate.

I have many golden memories of the long winding workouts on what turned out to be Black Game. I remember a particular one with the dog Idun who followed them efficiently down a decline across some banks until eventually producing the pack at a burn. Exhausted guns were raised which was pierced by the shouts of the keepers screaming “don’t shoot.”

“... After the first two days, a certain routine develops. The dogs are fed and kennelled, and checked for any injuries. A filled sheep trailer of straw has miraculous powers of recovery. Usually our stay includes a Sunday, which means a rest day for the dogs, if we are not counting with pups.

The shepherd takes the dog for a walk on that day to keep them limber.”

The one that was the carziest in the litter running non stop , social but extremley inpedendant. Probally not the pup I would have chosen but Hugh said you have a special dog there and a great start in the sport. We named her Genie.

As the weeks went on a friendship grew between myself and Hugh & Joan. We would train together most weekends and teaching me the sport of Field Trials. In a way I became the apprentace. Ballydavid Storm and Starjet are sired by International Field Trial Champion Ballydavid Airforce (T-Ebbas pup) and the mother was International Field Trial Champion Creg Rena. As it turned out Hugh kept a bitch from the litter who went on to become the youngest ever Field Trial Champion , International Field Trial Champion and also youngest ever Championship winner , Ballydavid Starjet of The Kindom. Genie possessed great speed and drive , stylish with a very natural quatering ability ,also great bird control from an early age.”

“In the Summer of 2003, Thore Sandström came to Ireland with the Swedish Red Setter Club to watch the Irish Red Setter clubs annual Summer trials on grouse. These trials are one of the highlights of the trialling circuit. At this time I competed with a dog Creg Jake who had strong Sheantullagh lines. He achieved 2nd place that day and Thore introduced himself and said he would like to use this dog in his future lines. Creg Jake went on to be a field trial champion amassing over 50 championship wins including 5 wins, 12 seconds and 8 thirds while also being placed 3 times in the International Championship stake. Thore admired the balance of the dog, head carriage and ability on birds years before this general consensus was reached.

So a plan was agreed that Thore would send over a female from his next litter and this would be the first Irish setter to be imported back to Ireland. Thore would pick the smallest female in the litter as in Ireland a lot of the competitions take place on soft ground.” Hugh Brady

So it was with huge excitement that the crate arrived with all the paperwork on a SAS flight from Stockholm. T- Ebba (called after Thore's daughter Ebba while all the litter began with the letter T) was a tall, lanky, skinny dog. She was not as good looking as Thore's usual lines. I took her out the first day and her feet cut up as her feet were soft from the snow. I walked her on the road to make her feet harder. I always will remember the first day I took her out and she pointed. I had a 12 week old setter puppy with her, who played with her tail and yet T-Ebba never moved from her point. She produced the pheasant and sat down. I had never seen such steadfast point from an Irish setter that met its first bird. On the moors she ran very wide maybe covering 400 metres each side of me. She never got tired and never panted after heavy exercise. I had never seen such speed and her point was just as sudden. She stopped as if she hits a wall. I was so worried something would happen to her and people would never get to see her compete. Because she was so talented I never really formally trained her. She pointed from the start and she was extremely intelligent so took hand directions naturally. You only had to tell her something once and it was remembered forever. She did not like if you were excited or angry and learned to sit in the front of the car while the other dogs sat in the boot.

At 10 months I ran her in the Irish Derby. She was remarkable and she covered the mountain at extreme speed. The judges liked her and gave her a third round as you must point a bird to receive an award. Indeed she did point grouse and stayed but I was so nervous I pointed her and did not move so eventually she moved off to hunt again. She ran in another open stake and had a memorable back at top speed a skill a trait that is not renowned in red setters in Ireland. She was very stylish and people were very excited to see this Swedish dog returning to her native land. I ran her in a novice trial the same month and she got 2nd place in arable lands so this qualified her for open trials. It was her first time in this sort of ground and it was the first time I had qualified a dog so young. In the pub afterwards people told me that she was special. Then disaster struck!

Due to some damage to my house T-Ebba lived in Galway with my father and F.T.Ch Creg Jake mated with her. Through the pregnancy she did not show anything – she was as lean as ever. In fact five days before the pups came she was awarded 2nd place in an open trial. Pups were an impossibility! However she whelped eight pups (5 dogs and 3 bitches) and the Ballydavid kennel was born.

Three months after the pups were born the famous Irish Red Setter Club two day trials were held on grouse. The first day was the Confined All-Aged trial on grouse and in the second round she followed a cock grouse a long distance and produced him. She won the trial and I was presented by the breeder of T-Ebba's grandmother Thodos Lazy which was Britt-Marie Dornell. This was a most momentous day for me. The next day was the International Open Stake for Setters and Pointers and again she won this prestigious trial.

Only John Nash's Moanruad Quiva had done this double. She also won the next trial I entered her becoming a champion in a month at the age of 20 months old. She also won the Irish Red Setter Club Open International trial for Setters and Pointers on pheasant becoming the only dog to ever win three of their 4 trials in the one year. She received 3rd in the final confined red setter trial on pheasant. She was to win this trial in 2010 therefore being the only setter to win the 4 Irish red setter trials – two on grouse and two on pheasant. Also in that first year she came perilously close to winning the Irish Championship coming second and winning two more trials. The most memorable being the Irish Field Trials Association where she pointed a grouse in each of her three rounds in extremely hot weather and high heather.

In the 54th running of the Irish Championship held in **August 2012**, **Glynlark Apollo was declared the winner**. This was a significant achievement, especially after his third-place finish in the previous year's event

Earlier Career

Before these championships, Glynlark Apollo had a successful novice career. In 2009, he won three out of the four Novice Stakes he ran in Scotland. He continued to perform well in subsequent years, including winning the Northern Counties Pointer and Setter Society's stake in August 2010.

“ Irish FTCh **Glynlark Playfair** - aka Paddy was the most powerful dog I have owned. I think he had lots in common with my first dog Glenlark Ranger – his great-grandfather. He had blistering speed – would take on an amazing beat – didn’t care whether he was running on flat ground or hilly. Billy Darragh judged him one Spring on the Crag above Amulree. We were walking across the hill, with the dogs having to do the slope – a very, very steep incline. Billy said afterwards – he went up the hill like a really good dog and down it like a raving lunatic. It was coming down that he had one of his most amazing finds. He was full speed with gravity adding to his speed when he got scent from the other side of a very big boulder. He threw himself around and somehow landed on point. Working out around the rock, which totally obscured his line, he produced his birds. This litter all had what I most value in dogs – what I call the “Bang-point” they get wind of game and slam onto point. They had no desire to wind and check or drop the nose and root around on foot scent. There was no creeping in any of them or desire to close the gap on game when they first located it.” Carol Calvert

“ FTCh. **Rushfield Holy** – There is a remarkable story tied up with this IRSB. She was a shooting bitch who was brought to Ireland in 2003, when she was 7. She had never been trialled before, but had spent each summer working the grouse moors of the Scottish Highlands with her owner and breeder John Kerr and with his great friend Lawton Evans, when John’s health prevented him from getting to the moors during the shooting season.

John decided to come over to Ireland to make Holly, or Molly as she was affectionately known to my young IRSD Glynlark Playfair (Paddy). John set off by train with his luggage, a dog crate and Molly on the lead and travelled to Stranraer, changing train stations in Glasgow, to get the ferry for Belfast, where I picked him up late one Friday evening. Next day we headed to the NI Pointer Club Trial at Glarryford where John ran Molly in the Open Stake. He wasn’t as mobile as he used to be and Molly considerably stayed with him and therefore missed the chance of birds on her beat. The next weekend was the Ulster Irish Red Setter Club’s Open Breed Stake where John decided on the morning of the trial to delegate the handling of Molly to the nearest passing handler, who just happened to be Gerald Devine. Gerald and Molly set up, despite never having been in each other’s company before – put in 2 good rounds and had a nice find and won the Stake, relegating my Mary Kate and Flynn to 2nd and 3rd positions respectively. Following this John returned

home to Aberdeenshire, leaving Molly with me and we headed back to Glarryford on the following Saturday. This time Molly was handled by me, as Gerald was running his full quota of 5 dogs. Guess what? Again she put in an immaculate performance of quartering in Round 1. She came on point on top of a six foot back in the second round. She thought about jumping straight down when I asked her to move in, but instead ran off to the right where the bank sloped down to level out with the lower ground, she skipped onto that ground, turned left hugging the bank and resumed her point directly below where she'd frozen initially. This time 2 steps forward saw her producing her cock pheasant and she was totally steady. When the awards were announced she'd won her second Open stake thus gaining her title in just 3 Trials. She

stayed with me, was bred and produced 6 pups – 1 male and 5 female. I kept 2 – Rushfield Sheilin and Rushfield Santa. Sheilin became a FTCh with ease and Santa, though never trained, produced my Int FTCh Glynlark Apollo when mated to **IntFTCh Glynlark Flynn**. Both ladies shared their mother's athletic lean physique – could run for fun and had absolutely lethal noses.

Molly returned to live with John and in August 2005 at the age of 9 he brought her along to the North of Scotland Gundog Association's summer Open. John was Field Trial Secretary of this Club and I thought he'd just brought her to renew our acquaintance. However when I looked at the card and saw she was entered with me as her handler I got quite a surprise. How would she cope with not having seen me for such a long time. The answer to that was – calmly and without fuss. There was one occasion, shortly after I'd cast her off in the first round when I had to hold her on a back to her bracedmate. I was standing beside her with my hand up and I swear she looked at me as if to say "who on earth are you?" However, after that she decided as usual that it didn't matter who I was, she was the old pro and could do the job impeccably no matter what eejit was standing beside her and she did. Despite being far from match fit, she quartered beautifully and with power and had several excellent finds – securing second place in what was to be her final trial.

"Int. FTCh. **Glynlark Flynn** – " Flynn was my "insurance" dog. His style was not as spectacular as his flamboyant brother and sister Paddy and Kate, but he was deadly accurate around game. His ground coverage was naturally flatter – he had none of Paddy and Kate's desire to hunt the next hill – he was content to quarter the ground in front of him. He was the first of the litter to win an Open



Stake and also the last. He figured in the 2007 Irish Championship taking 3rd when I feel Kate had the trial in her pocket, but blew it in the second round. He also bred well producing Int FTCh Glynlark Apollo who took 3rd place, like his father in the 2011 Irish Championship before winning the 2012 event. His second son Glynlark Aramis, in the hands of Davy O'Neill, was 3rd in the GB Champion Stake in 2012 – making it a great year for the Glynlarks. “ Carol Calvert

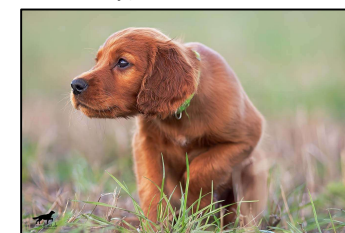

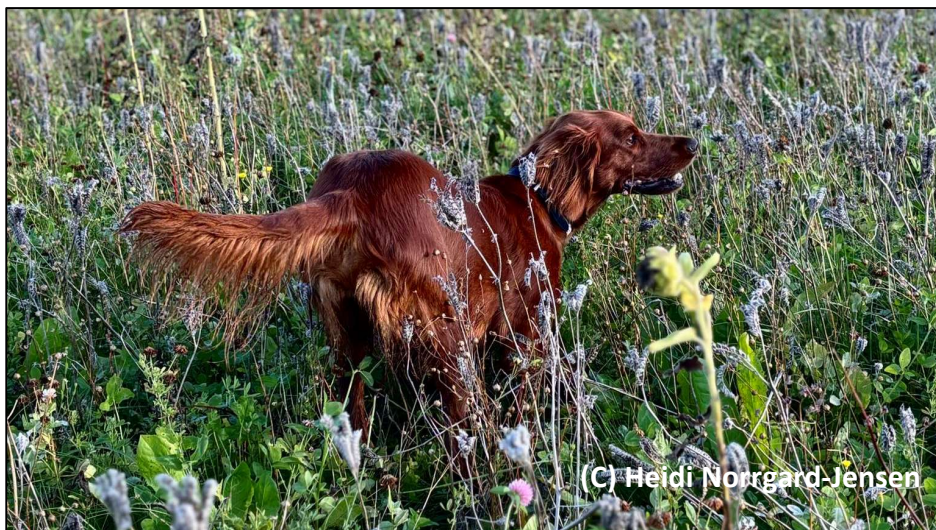
